Everything Set for Best Future of Freedom Conf.

Oct. 1, 2 & 3-Cal State Univ., Long Beach

It is one of the best line-up of speakers in years, according to Terry Diamond, co-manager of the 10th Future of Freedom Conference. Scheduled for Oct. 1, 2 & 3, the Rampart Institute co-sponsored conference has 16 well-known speakers.

Perhaps the best-known speakers are Dr. Thomas Szasz, professor of Psychology at the Upstate Medical Center at Syracuse, New York, and author of a dozen books, including The Myth of Mental Illness; Dr. Nathaniel Branden, a former close associate of the late Ayn Rand, psychologist and author of half-a-dozen books, including The Psychology of Self-Esteem; and Douglas Casey, financial expert and author of two best-sellers, Crisis Investing and Strategic Investing.

Other speakers include: John Pugsley, Barbara Branden, Robert LeFevre, Dr. John Hospers, Devers Branden, Gary Hudson, Jeff Riggenbach, David Bergland, Wendy McElroy, Jack Matonis, Roger Callahan, Thomas Hazlett and others.

The Great Debates

Two great debates have been arrranged. The debate between Tom Bartman and George Smith is the most controversal one. George Smith, author and lecturer, has recently completed a book on voluntary schooling vs. government schooling with Prof. Jack High. Smith takes a hard-line approach to government schooling, contending that government should never be involved in educating people. Bartman, a member of the conservative Bus-Stop in Los Angeles is a high official in public education who believe that change in the government school system can

improve education. Moderated by Manny Klausner, attorney and an editor of "Reason" magazine, the Smith vs. Bateman debate on Oct. 3 should be outstanding.

The other debate will pit Prof. David Friedman against Jeffrey R. Hummel on "Should Americans Have A Military Force for Defense?" A professor of economics at UCLA, Friedman takes a more traditional approach to defense. Hummel, a former tank platoon commander in the U.S. Army and an editor for Free Texas and Caliber, advocates unilateral disarmament.

The conference begins with a Friday-night tribute banquet honoring Nathaniel Branden at the Long Beach Holiday Inn. Before the tribute, the first annual Mencken Awards for outstanding journalism will be award by Jeff Riggenbach and others. The Mencken Awards, presented by the newly formed Free Press Association, will be honoring journalists for Best Political Book, Best Editorial, Best Editorial Cartoon, Best News Story or Investigative Report, and Best Essay or Review.

The Saturday Night Party will start with a comedy routine by Thomas Hazlett and others. Next a live band will provide soft rock and sixties dance music. For the admission price, snacks and drink will be provided (all you can eat and drink). The festivities start at 8:30 pm.

Keys to Learning Conf. to be Held on Aug. 22

The second "Keys To Learning/Expo '82 is scheduled for Sunday, August 22 at the Rupp Memorial Auditorium at 11111 Harris Ave. in Lynwood. Under the theme title Home—The Place to Build America," the one-day conference will center on alternatives to public education.

Two of the best known speakers are Dr. Raymond and Dorothy Moore, authors of *Home Spun Schools* and *Home Grown Kids*. They are experts in early childhood development, home schooling and teaching techniques.

Others speakers include Lawrence and Bonnie Williams, directors of Oak Meadow School in Ojai, California, which is a private school based on independent education and other alternative schooling methods. Another speaker, Larry Sewell, is an instructor for the Freemen Institute. And the final speaker is Daniel d'Avignon, and official of the Libertarian Innovatory for Freedominium organization.

Kenneth Gregg, Jr. Seminar to be Held

Starting Oct. 17

A five lecture series beginning Sunday, Oct. 17 at 9:30 a.m. at the Rampart Institute lecture facility (2727 S. Croddy Way, Suite J, Santa Ana) will be delivered by Kenneth R. Gregg, Jr., president of Rampart Institute.

The course will center on the history of early libertarian thinkers and movements including the precursers to libertarianism--Marsiglio of Padua, Vanini, Spinoza and others. Gregg will spent considerable time on Free-Born John and the Levellers of England, along with Milton and Locke in the transmission of tradition; the Enlightenment traditions of Newton and Liberal Christianity vs. Toland and the Deists; world revolution with Paine, Sieyes and French Radicalism; the Abolitionism Era of Garrison Spooner, Weld and Sharpe; the Failed Revolution period of Radical Republicanism and Anarchism; the Anarchist Era of Individualist Anarchism; Classical Liberalism and Henry George; and finally Spencer Heath and the rise of subjective value theory.



New Opposition Seen In The Soviet Union

An amazing article recently appeared in the June 2 edition of Soviet Analyst. The article reports on a underground resistance organization in the Soviet Union, known as 'The Initiative Group for National Democracy' (IGND). Material by IGND has been circulated in Russia and is causing a stir. An extract from IGND material follow:

The party leadership, having established in our country a totalitarian regime under the guise of the "most democratic and progressive society" is consistently and in a planned way carrying out an imperialist expansionist policy, aimed at establishing ideological, political and military hegemony not only over the countries of the socialist community, not only in the communist and national-liberation movement, but also throughout the world.

Centered in Moscow, IGND's principles were drafted in July, 1981, which suggests that they were clearly influenced by events in Poland. The four main aims of IGND are full civil and political rights, establishment of a parliamentary democracy, mixed economy of state and privately owned enterprises, and a federation of the various national republics of the Soviet Union with the choice to remain or leave the union.

Except for economics, IGND has a relatively good set of principles to work from. There is no indication of how large a group IGND has become, or whether it is operated by a few dedicated Russians. Whatever the case, IGND could be the beginning of a new movement in Russia. Hopefully, these Russian dissenters will be as widely accepted in Russia as Solidarity is in Poland.

Free County Project is Under Study

For almost a decade, several organizations, businessmen and individuals have shown interest in free ports, floating islands and stationary islands, especially off the California coastline. A new newsletter called "Free Country Newsletter" is the latest publication to advocate the formation of a island or region without governmental coercion. Edited and published by Ed Andrews, the Denver-based newsletter concentrates on the new nation concept as a proprietary community. This, according to Andrews, would avoid the hassle and distractions of forming a government, writing a constitution acceptable to an overwhelming majority of settlers, judicial structures, regulations and power politics. Of course, this may appear irresponsible, but not in the light of a proprietary community (or as others call it — a contractual society).

A number of people at Rampart Institute are studying the proprietary community concept. Perhaps one of the best reading materials on this type of community was written by Spencer H. MacCallum in *The Art of Community*, published by the Institute for Humane Studies. MacCallum goes into great detail on examples of proprietary communities such as hotels, shopping centers, and industrial parks that have contracted out all services to private vendors, including policing, fire protection, streets and garbage collection.

It isn't hard to transpose MacCallum's proprietary ideas to an artifically-built island nation free of national debt, regulations, taxation and legislative law. In fact, it would seem only a matter of time before business interest and liberty seekers allied themselves together in a island-building venture.
